Support from an ASBAH fieldworker

In 1966, when ASBAH was formed, many children with Spina Bifida and Hydrocephalus died in infancy. But the past 30 years have seen major advances in medical care which have transformed the picture so that now - with ASBAH's help - children and young adults are using their talents and overcoming problems. Nowadays, many people with these disabilities are helping to run ASBAH. And we are pushing through a regional development programme to bring the management of our services closer to home and give close support to staff working in the field.

ASBAH also raises money to boost research aimed at improving the medical, social and educational prospects of people with Spina

Bifida and Hydrocephalus.

Our honorary consultant in hydrocephalus, Dr. Roger Bayston (pictured below), is a leading authority on the improvement of treatments for people with hydrocephalus.

Our efforts paved the way for the important discovery that the vitamin Folic Acid helps to prevent Spina Bifida in pregnancy. We are also helping in the search for an effective way to treat hydrocephalus without surgery, and in developing a screening test to identify mothers at risk of having a baby with Spina Bifida.







I believe that ASBAH has the ideals and dynamic management to take us well into the next century.

ASBAH has contributed to medical advances over the last 30 years which mean that many children with Spina Bifida and Hydrocephalus are becoming adults. They deserve the best chances in life.
